

### Biography:

**Dr. Uladzislau Belavusau** is Senior Researcher in European Law at the *T.M.C. Asser Institute* (the Hague) – *University of Amsterdam* (the Netherlands). Previously, he was Assistant Professor in EU law and human rights at the *Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam* (2011-2015). He holds a Ph.D. from the *European University Institute* (Florence, Italy) and an LL.M. from the *Collège d'Europe* (Bruges, Belgium). His research and teaching cover various areas of EU law (especially constitutional and anti-discrimination law), human rights and memory politics.

Dr Belavusau has held visiting fellowships at the *University of California at Berkeley* (USA), *Max-Planck-Institut für ausländisches öffentliches Recht und Völkerrecht* (Germany), *York University* (Canada), and *Tel Aviv University* (Israel). For the fall semester 2019, he is invited as a BiLAP fellow at the *Università degli Studi Milano-Bicocca*, and for spring 2020, he is invited as a Fernand Braudel Senior Fellow at the *European University Institute* in Florence (Italy). In addition, he has guest lectured at the *Amsterdam University College*, *Tilburg University*, *Rijksuniversiteit Groningen* (The Netherlands), *European Law Academy* (Trier, Germany), *York University* (Canada), *Masaryk University* (Czechia), *Central European University* (Hungary), *Polish Academy of Sciences* (Poland), at a summer training at the *EUI* in Florence and at the *LUISS Guido Carli University* in Rome (Italy).

In 2016-2019, he was a Principal Investigator for the Dutch team in the EU-sponsored research consortium *MELA* (“Memory Laws in European and Comparative Perspective”, [www.melaproject.org](http://www.melaproject.org)). In 2015, the International Association of Labour Law Journals conferred him the Marco Biagi Award for the best paper in labour law.

Currently he is working on his second monograph *Sex in the Union* (for Cambridge University Press). He is the author of *Freedom of Speech: Importing European and US Constitutional Models in Transitional Democracies* (Routledge, 2013), as well as co-editor of *Law and Memory: Towards Legal Governance of History* (Cambridge University Press, 2017), *EU Anti-Discrimination Law Beyond Gender* (Hart: Oxford, 2018) and *Constitutionalism under Stress* (Oxford University Press, forthcoming in 2020).
